

FEASTING

We think of ourselves as living in the land of the free and the home of the brave. Last week I suspect the turkeys did not see it that way; they died so many of us could let out our belts a notch or two. The original pilgrims had left England during a time of religious persecution; they settled in Holland but then, worried that their children would lose their English language and culture, they set out for the new world. The passage across the Atlantic in 1620 had not been easy for the pilgrims and during that first year they feared they would starve. The holiday of Thanksgiving celebrated their first successful harvest. These pilgrims were religious people; they recognized that their very survival was a great gift from God.

A lot of Jesus' ministry had to do with eating and drinking. In his first miracle at Cana, he turned water into very good wine at a wedding reception; it must have been a good party because the hosts were running low. With the help of his disciples Jesus repeatedly fed thousands of the poor. He dined as the guest of a Pharisee who became alarmed because Jesus hadn't washed his hands when he came in as was the custom. Jesus said of himself: "The Son of Man came eating and drinking, and they say, 'Behold, a gluttonous man and a drunkard, a friend of tax collectors and sinners! Yet wisdom is vindicated by her deeds." People wondered about it, "The disciples of John often fast and offer prayers, the disciples of the Pharisees also do the same, but Yours eat and drink." The last thing Jesus did before he was arrested was to eat and drink the Passover meal with his disciples. During that meal, he declared that the bread was his own body and the wine was his blood that would be poured out and then he commanded his disciples to eat his flesh and drink his blood in memory of him.

Of course, there's more to it than that. The Lord himself pointed out that the people of God "were eating, they were drinking, they were marrying, they were being given in marriage, until the day that Noah entered the ark, and the flood came and destroyed them all." We also need a true conversion of heart. Our actions must reflect our discipleship. We can party with our friends and family but we should not be heedless to the cries of the hungry and thirsty poor.

It is not unusual for me to arrive at my brother's for Thanksgiving and be introduced to some friend or coworker who had nowhere particular to go for the feast and so are welcomed into his home. My brother can easily do that because there is never a shortage of food on the table, and never a shortage of cooks. Over the years each of us have been given certain responsibilities. Mine, for instance, is making the gravy; and there needs to be a lot of gravy because there must be enough, not just for Thanksgiving, but also for turkey sandwiches the next day at lunch.

Sometimes there doesn't seem to be enough room in the kitchen for all of us working on our various duties but it is my favorite time of the day. A football game is playing in the next room but no one is watching it. "Will you pass me the salt?" My brother has a big postit note on the refrigerator listing what temperatures the oven should be at for how long—the turkey covered or uncovered—so it will be cooked perfectly. (Each year he tweaks his recipe based on the previous years' experience.) "Where's the ladle? It was here a minute ago." "Check the potatoes. I think they are done but we don't want lumpy mashed potatoes." "Tell me when it's time to start carving the turkey." We usually forget one of the ingredients—often the yams—and only realize they were still in the oven after we've eaten dinner and are getting ready for pumpkin pie.

At the start of the meal we pray, giving each attendee a chance to be specific about what he or she is thankful for in the last year. At first, I think that it has been a pretty typical year with nothing fancy to be grateful for, but then my memory kicks in: I had that fall and am glad I had the doctors and nurses to patch me up and for my sister who dropped everything to come and take care of me after surgery. But there are others, many others, as each of us counts our blessings.
