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SAINT FRANCIS DE SALES

Out of Vatican II came *Lumen Gentium*, the Dogmatic Constitution on the Church, which reminded everyone that "all the faithful of Christ of whatever rank or status, are called to the fullness of the Christian life and to

the perfection of charity." This is not new; Jesus himself said, "Be perfect as your heavenly Father is perfect." Too many people dispense themselves from striving for holiness, leaving all that to "the priests and nuns." It is true that life gets complicated, especially if you are the parents of children and must work—sometimes two jobs—to be able to provide for them. But the fact that it is difficult should not be used as an excuse.

To help people know how to live their spiritual lives, Saint Francis de Sales wrote a book, *The Introduction*

to the Devout Life, in 1609. It became very popular because it was filled with practical information.

Knowing that progress in the spiritual life is often slow, he advised, "Be patient with everyone, but above all with yourself. I mean, do not be disheartened by your imperfections, but always rise up with fresh courage. How are we to be patient in dealing with our neighbor's faults if we are impatient in dealing with our own? He who is fretted by his own failings will not correct them. All profitable correction comes from a calm, peaceful mind."

To the charge that it was impossible to live such a life in the midst of "the world" Francis responded, "devotion in no way spoils anything if it is true; rather it makes everything perfect. When it conflicts with any person's legitimate occupation, it is without doubt false. 'The bee,' says Aristotle, 'sucks honey from flowers without damaging them,' leaving them as whole and fresh as it found them. But true devotion does even better. Not only does it not spoil any sort of life-

situation or occupation, but on the contrary enriches it and makes it attractive."

"God wishes our perfection but also wishes our liber-

ty," he insisted. Holiness is not a specific role to be played or a certain way of acting. Read the lives of the saints and you will see that these were not people who were trying to be the kind of person they were expected to be. Rather growth in holiness leads to maturity in a person. We say, "grace builds on nature," but Francis also believed that nature is nourished by grace.

I remember a time when someone told me how his friend told him some hard things about himself that he was not pleased to hear. "Was what he said true?" I asked.

"Sure," he answered, "but he had no right, he had no right!" If I had known it then, I could have quoted Saint Francis, "Good advice should be received whether it is soaked in gall or preserved in honey.... Do not allow the contention which your spirit may have felt against those who have previously wished to correct you to prejudice you against the heavenly sight." On second thought, I doubt that would have helped. He wasn't in the mood.

All of us would rather not hear the difficult truths. Saint Francis knew that: "The Lord wishes to speak to us amid thorns and briars, as he did to Moses, and we instead want Him to talk to us amid pleasant, fresh breezes, as he did to Elijah."

This time of year vacations are what is on our minds but once you are back from your vacation, let Saint Francis de Sales be your guide in deepening your spiritual life.

TREASURES FROM TRADITION

The American Revolution cleared the way for freedom of religion in the former colonies, since the colonies had always been a more religiously tolerant place than the old country. Even so, colonial laws restricted the practice of the Catholic faith, and just as in England, Americans who desired to be priests or nuns had to go to the Netherlands or France. As political storm clouds gathered in France, an American woman, Mother Bernardina Matthews, the prioress of the Hoogstraeten Carmel in Holland, made a brave move. With two other American nuns, her nieces, and a Dutch sister, she came to Port Tobacco, Maryland, in 1790. Within twenty years the community had grown to twenty, although by 1823 their farm failed and they had to move to Baltimore and open a school. The Carmelite order requires contemplation and cloister, so in time the school was closed. The Port Tobacco land had long since been sold, but in 1976 a community of nuns was able to return thanks to loyal neighbors who had worked for forty years for their restoration.
