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SILENCE

I remember I was talking to my mother on a summer morning, both of us sitting at the dining table. As always, the TV across the room was on, tuned to one of the morning talk shows. We were having a really good conversation which I wanted to continue without distraction, so when she went into the kitchen to get more coffee, I grabbed the remote and switched off the TV. When she came back, she noticed immediately, "Why'd you turn that off. I was watching that!" The TV was her constant companion.

I remember in the old days, when people were waiting in line, or out in front of their house watching for somebody to pick them up or sitting in a movie theater before the show began, many would pull out a cigarette and have a smoke. It was a habit, something to do.

Times have changed. Nowadays, if people have a few minutes, what do they do? They whip out their "personal devices" to check for messages, make a call or send a text message. The other day a very close friend of mine called just to chat as he was driving. I told him—after conversing amicably for a few minutes—that I had to go; I wanted to get my work done and myself drive home.

In the first years I was in the seminary, we were not allowed to have radios, stereos or personal TVs. (The computer hadn't been invented yet.) There was one TV, located in the rec hall, and it could be watched only at certain hours and for primarily news and educational programs. After night prayer, "magnum silencium" was the rule; it meant that there should be no talking until after morning prayer the next morning. I'm not claiming that we were perfectly faithful to these rules, but one had to at least give the impression you were if you wanted to stay in the seminary. At first, I didn't see the point. All day long we followed a rigid schedule of prayer, classes, chores, study hall and organized athletic exercises and sports. What harm would there be for a few of us to just hang out?

But that formation, unyielding as it was, did give me an appetite for that "silencium." I got to value kneeling in silence before the Blessed Sacrament and sitting for long periods of quiet meditation each day. It was com-

forting to hear nothing but the sound of our footsteps and the squeaking of the chapel door as it opened and closed as seminarians and faculty crossed the plaza to take our places at the beginning of the day.

Several times in my life I have made a silent retreat. The only speaking took place at the liturgies and when speaking with one's director. The rest of the time, including meals, was conducted in silence. On the first day of each of these retreats, I was restless, wondering what I was going to do with myself. But I settled down and the rest of time was refreshing. I left behind a lot of my self-consciousness, less worried what others might be thinking of me. And something got released during those days. When not pre-

occupied with all the things on the surface, thoughts, memories and feelings welled up from my inner depths, depths that I hadn't known were in there.

Most significantly the solitude made it easier for me to sense the presence of God with me.

Don't take it from me. Try it yourself.

We now live in a world where there is AM and FM radio, television with 500 channels of choice, audio systems with their music libraries or stacks of CDs and now there's even Spotify. Never a reason to be bored, but never a moment of peace and quiet. Our continual state is noisy distraction.

One of the unexpected benefits may be that we become better listeners. The Australian Trappist, Michael Casey, reminds us that "Good listening is the sincerest form of kindness and the supreme mark of honor that we can give another." Listening is a form of contemplation. But it only works if you do more than simply shut your mouth; you must also switch off that inner voice that's always commenting on and evaluating everything and everyone.

You can start by following the advice of the great Argentinian writer, Jorge Luis Borges: "Don't talk unless you can improve on the silence." Msgr. Mike
