PROTECTING CHILDREN

Like many of you, I have been quite dismayed by the many revelations of child sexual abuse by members of the clergy and other religious personnel. I have been particularly depressed and ashamed that there were members of the Orange presbyterate that committed such acts, men that I knew personally. I am proud of Bishop Brown who worked to settle our many civil suits, the first diocese in California to do so.

In June 2002, the U.S. bishops established *The Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People*, a comprehensive set of procedures addressing allegations of sexual abuse of minors by Catholic clergy. The *Charter* also includes guidelines for reconciliation, healing, accountability, and prevention of future acts of abuse. It was revised in 2005, 2011, and 2018.

A lot of people are pointing fingers, making accusations, calling for bishops to resign, or defending bishops uncritically. When there is controversy in the Church I try to find out what Timothy Radcliffe thinks. Radcliffe is a Dominican priest, preacher and writer, who also spent ten years as Master of the whole Dominican Order. This is what he had to say:

“It is generally imagined that the Vatican is a vast and efficient organization. In fact it is tiny. The CDF [Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith] only employs 45 people, dealing with doctrinal and disciplinary issues for a Church which has 1.3 billion members, 17 per cent of the world's population, and some 400,000 priests. When I dealt with the CDF as Master of the Dominican Order, it was obvious that they were struggling to cope. Documents slipped through the cracks. Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger lamented to me that the staff was simply too small for the job.

People are furious with the Vatican's failure to open up its files and offer a clear explanation of what happened.

Why is it so secretive? Angry and hurt Catholics feel a right to transparent government. I agree. But we must, in justice, understand why the Vatican is so self-protective. There were more martyrs in the twentieth century than in all the previous centuries combined. Bishops and priests, Religious and laity were assassinated in Western Europe, in Soviet countries, in Africa, Latin America and Asia.

Many Catholics still suffer imprisonment and death for their faith. Of course, the Vatican tends to stress confidentiality; this has been necessary to protect the Church from people who wish to destroy her. So it is understandable that the Vatican reacts aggressively to demands for transparency and will read legitimate requests for openness as a form of persecution. And some people in the media do, without any doubt, wish to damage the credibility of the Church.

But we owe a debt of gratitude to the press for its insistence that the Church face its failures. If it had not been for the media, then this shameful abuse might have remained unaddressed.

Confidentiality is also a consequence of the Church's insistence on the right of everyone accused to keep their good name until they are proved to be guilty. This is very hard for our society to understand, whose media destroy people's reputations without a thought.

Why go [i.e. leave the Church]? If it is to find a safer haven, a less corrupt Church, then I think that you will be disappointed.”

Jesus came to save sinners. but sinners have to do their part and repent. Let every member of the Church from the pope on down to us here at St. Anne's do everything possible to protect every child and vulnerable person.

GOOD FRIDAY

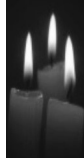


MEMORY LOSS DISCUSSION
