

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# A HISTORY OF HELL

n the center of Florence, Italy, in front of its famous duomo, stands a baptistry. The walls inside of the baptistry are covered with mosaics. Foremost among them is Christ, as judge of the living and the dead. On one side of him are the saved, saints seated in orderly fashion like patrons in boxes waiting for the opera to begin. On the other side one finds hell with Satan at the center apparently eating one of the damned while torturing two others, one in his right hand and the other in his left. He is surrounded by lesser demons also punishing the damned in various ways. The scene is frightening and surely accomplished what was its obvious goal: to give those coming for baptism an awareness of what would be their lot is they continued to live a sinful life.

At the end of Matthew's gospel, the last judgement is portrayed as sending the cursed, into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels. (Look to Genesis to see the earlier rebellion.) Mark also imagines hell as unquenchable fire. The author of the Book of Revelation paints the image more vividly: "for the cowardly, the faithless, the detestable, as for murderers, the sexually immoral, sorcerers, idolaters, and all liars, their portion will be in the lake that burns with fire and sulfur, which is the second death."

An earlier image of the afterlife was *sheol*, whose inhabitants were "shades," creatures lacking personality or strength. Originally, all the deceased went there indiscriminately; later there was a distinction between the just and the wicked, separated into their respective sections, much like the compartments on an airplane, business class in front with plush seats, much fawned over by the angels, with the rest of the folk packed tightly together in the back with little leg room. Imagine that for all eternity! In a further development, the just were upgraded to heaven, *sheol* being thereafter reserved only for the wicked.

The larger scenario of the New Testament describes God's mercy. Jesus came as savior of all, though it took the people of God some time to believe that. First, they thought it was only for the faithful children of Israel, then salvation was reserved for faithful Jews and Jewish disciples of Jesus. It took a Saint Paul to break down the barriers so that Jesus was understood as a universal savior, including Gentiles.

This did not take place without a fight. There seems always to be a temptation toward exclusivity. "Here is my God and no one else's." We Catholics had a dose of this over the centuries. St. Cyprian of Carthage articulated the ancient saying, "outside the Church there is no salvation." He was saying this at a time of great turbulence, persecution and confusion, aiming at keeping the various factions of believers united. Later on, the maxim was used in a narrower way, suggesting that none but those baptized in union with the Holy See were permitted. Your neighbor the Buddhist would not be your neighbor in heaven, not even the heretical Presbyterian you play tennis with. Heaven will certainly be spacious since none but Catholics will be allowed.

To believe that would be to put limits on God's mercy, something no creature should do. Jesus died on a cross to save us, all of us, and who is to say how he judges? Remember on the cross he welcomed into paradise the thief crucified beside him; he did not first ask to see his baptismal certificate. Who is to say that God does not also inspire to greater or lesser degrees the faith of believers of all kinds, not to mention to bless the lives of non-believers?

This is not to say that baptism is unimportant. Baptism is the doorway to all the graces of the sacraments. It is God's invitation to eternal life with him. Each year on the anniversary of my baptism, January 20<sup>th</sup>, I do something to celebrate, considering it just as important as my birthday. But I am also sure that God has many other ways of extending his love—even his salvation—to his varied and beloved creatures.
