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# SAINT JOHN HENRY NEWMAN

When I was studying in Rome back in the 80's, many of the courses in fundamental theology were mandatory, but the faculty left room for students to take electives. One of the most fruitful for me was a seminar on the writings of John Henry Newman. I had heard of his name and probably tried reading some of his writing but Newman was a Victorian and I was put off by the Victorian style. We were assigned to read his "An Essay on the Development of Christian Doctrine."

Who was John Henry Newman? The latest is that he was just canonized a saint on October 13<sup>th</sup> by Pope Francis. But he began his adult life as an Anglican

clergyman. He taught in various posts at Oxford and attracted hundreds of students, university officials and townspeople with his scholarly but personal preaching. He had an influential role in what was called the Oxford Movement, a High Church effort to return to the foundations of the faith.

Newman made a voyage to the coasts of North Africa, Italy, West-

ern Greece, and Sicily between December 1832 and July 1833, which he recorded the sights and his reactions in his diaries. The illness which almost ended Newman's life when he visited Sicily in April and May of 1833 can be explained in various ways. A matter-of-fact explanation diagnoses it as a bad case of typhoid fever. A year later, in 1834, Newman himself interpreted his illness as a demonic trial that he suffered before starting the work God intended him to do. It was pivotal start of what some scholars call his 'second journey.'

In "An Essay on the Development of Christian Doctrine" Newman outlined his study of the church's history of doctrinal development. Unlike theologians before him, he did not think of the handing down of the "deposit of faith" to be like one generation passing on the contents of a book to the next generation. He saw that believers, meditating on what had been given to them, saw more in what had been given to them;

doctrine developed over time, became more sophisticated, without turning into something else, which would be heresy.

This distinction ultimately led him to leave the Anglican Church and resign his pastoral position at Oxford. When he did so his siblings shunned him; his sister, Harriet considered his act a "betrayal" and never spoke or wrote to him again. Two years later he was received into the Catholic Church and a year after that was ordained to the priesthood. He went on to establish the Oratory of St. Philip Neri in Birmingham and, later on, tried unsuccessfully to

establish the Catholic University of Ireland in Dublin; the Irish bishops opposed him.

Besides his pastoral work and preaching, Newman had rich and "intense" friendships, particularly with the Oratorian priest, Ambrose St. John. Upon the death of Father St. John in 1878, Newman suffered tremendous grief. "I have ever thought that no bereavement

was equal to that of a husband's or wife's, but I feel it difficult to believe that any can be greater, or anyone's sorrow greater than mine," wrote Newman about his friend's death.

During all this time, he wrote numerous books. His spiritual autobiography, "Apologia Pro Vita Sua," became a classic. In 1879, Pope Leo XIII awarded him a place in the College of Cardinals, an act Newman felt unworthy of.

Newman himself died on the eleventh of August 1890. At pivotal points in his life he turned to the following prayer, which he himself had written:

Lead, Kindly Light, amid the encircling gloom Lead Thou me on! The night is dark, and I am far from home— Lead Thou me on!

# WORLD MISSION SUNDAY

Pope Francis has set October 2019 as an Extraordinary Missionary Month to foster greater awareness of "missio ad gentes" (mission to all peoples) and to animate the missionary transformation of Church life and pastoral activity. He asked each country to highlight a great missionary who shared their life for the love of the Gospel. The U.S.A. chose Sister Dorothy Stang, SNDdeN, who was martyred in Brazil in 2005 because of her defense of Indigenous people and the Environment.

"Celebrating this Extraordinary Missionary month will help us first to rediscover the missionary dimension of our faith in Jesus Christ, a faith graciously bestowed on us in baptism....
