

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# CHRISTMAS AS A CHILD

I was reminiscing the other day about what Christmas was like when I was a small child. This was before my sister was even born. One particular Christmas morning I woke up in my bed and peaked out the window next to me and was certain I saw the backside of Santa rushing toward the backyard with a sack of toys over his shoulder. That was good news; there was always the chance, our parents reminded us, that if we had been naughty, Santa would skip our house and leave no presents. My brother and I had good reason to worry.

These were the days before Christmas eve Masses; the earliest Christmas Mass was at midnight. My brother and I would never last that late; so we went to the early Mass on Christmas day. As we marched out to the garage, my father held out his big, long overcoat to block our view of what might be under the tree. Mass was in

Latin then and had little to offer youngsters; most of our time was devoted to trying to sit still and not kick the pew ahead of us. It seemed endless.

Then we were in the car returning home, exploding with anticipation. One year my mother suggested that we have our breakfast before we opened our presents but that was vetoed by everyone else including my Dad. She may have been kidding but it was no laughing matter to us. I went down the list in my head of the things I wanted to get, things that I

thought I had hinted about subtlety enough in the weeks preceding.

(Oh, I forgot to mention that on Christmas eve we were allowed to open one present: the one my grandmother got for us each year. It was always the same thing: pajamas. My brother and I did not consider pajamas a real present. Who cares what you wear when you sleep?)

I hardly now remember any of the toys I got for Christmas. There wasn't a one that captured my imagination, though I loved getting them. I do recall that the

pile of them, wrapped and ribboned, looked much larger than the pile of them once opened. I was always sorry for the moment when I opened my last gift. Yes, then I was ready to eat my breakfast.

My parents tried to teach us the meaning of Christmas in a way that our tiny minds could comprehend. They told us that Christmas was Jesus' birthday. I was going to ask, "Why then do we get the presents?" but thought better of it. My brother was of the opinion that if it was Jesus' birthday, Jesus ought to get a cake like everyone else on their birthday. My mother didn't have an answer for that so, from as far back as I can recall, Christmas dinner was finished by eating a slice of Jesus' birthday cake. (By the way, one of the ways we knew that Santa had come to our house was that on Christmas morning we saw that a slice of the cake

had been cut and eaten. Santa also polished off the milk we left out for him.)

I came to pity my poor father. Though I did not know it then, it was my father's duty, once we had gone to sleep, to assemble the gifts that required it, like a bike or a train set; like his son, he was not handy at such tasks. I can imagine my dad swearing, "Hells! Bells!" and my mother whispering, "Pat, shoosh! You'll wake up the kids."

People bemoan the commerciali-

zation of Christmas but, despite all that, the feast itself remains our most family-centric. As an adult, I could imagine a Christmas without presents but it wouldn't be Christmas if there weren't family and friends to share it with. On behalf of Fr. Ben, Fr. Bob and our parish staff, may your Christmas be blessed with whomever you celebrate it. That

includes all you who are visiting. Especially you!
