SAVORING

Until the advent of the internet I did not know I was so popular. There would be an occasional note in the mail or a personal thank you after Mass on Sunday. If I said something in my homily that concerned people, they would mull it over while driving home, walk into their homes and pull out a pad and pencil and sit down to write out their concerns. But, often enough, if the steam had worn off, they would get distracted or decide it wasn't worth all the effort to contact me. "Besides the knucklehead probably wouldn't pay any attention to it, anyway." If they did write, it would be Wednesday or Thursday before the postman delivered it, and only then would I find out by opening the envelope.

Now someone with a smart phone can send me a text message or a tweet during the offertory hymn. I might feel a slight buzz in my left pocket as we sing the Sanctus. I'm all for communication (and I email and text as much as anyone else) but I have learned the hard way, taking the needed time to sit with an idea or a feeling beforehand is just as important.

A good example of that is poetry. Poems, the good ones anyway, are words that paint a picture you didn't know you wanted to see until you saw it in the poem. Here's an example from one of my favorite poets, Mary Oliver:

PRAYING

It doesn't have to be
The blue iris, it could be
Weeds in a vacant lot, or a few
Small stones; just
Pay attention, then patch
A few words together and don't try
To make them elaborate, this isn't
A contest but the doorway
Into thanks, and a silence in which
Another voice may speak.



Though those forty or so words are Mary Oliver's, I identified with them completely the first time I read the poem, including the procession from object to paying attention, to reflection, to putting words together, to thanks and then to the silence in

which God's voice may speak (or whisper or inspire or challenge.)

Binx Bolling, the protagonist in Walker Percy's novel, *The Moviegoer*, says that the most important thing in life is to be engaged in a search which "is what anyone would undertake if he were not sunk in the everydayness of his own life.... To become aware of the search is to be on to something. Not to be on to something is to be in despair."

Besides being a novelist, Percy was a philosopher, so I am not surprised that "search" was his word for it. In the Bible we learn to look at the spiritual life as a pilgrimage. Moses led God's people out of slavery in

Egypt toward the land God promised that he would give them, "a land flowing with milk and honey." Jesus went up to Peter, James and John and the other apostles with only two words, "Follow me," which they did. From his letters and from the Acts of the Apostles, we learn about the many places Saint Paul visited to preach the good news to both Jews and gentiles. These are lives in motion, like our own.

Every morning when I sit down to my computer, I go through my emails and text messages. Some of them I respond to, others I forward so someone else who can properly respond to the writer but the majority of them I simply delete. With the more annoying ones, those I didn't solicit or want to read, I scroll down and hit the unsubscribe button. To be swallowed by one's unsolicited emails is to be "sunk in the everydayness of...life." None of us want that.






HUMAN TRAFFICKING

process as a freshman in high school and complete the
process at the end of their sophomore year.

Marriage: An appointment with one of our priests to
begin marriage preparation must be made at least 6
months before the wedding celebration.

Holy Communion, please contact the Parish Office.

Sacrament of the Sick: In case of serious illness, contact
