# **SAINTS**

Saints come in all shapes and sizes and they become patrons for the oddest reasons. Over time it becomes hard to separate truth from folklore.

St. Polycarp was a revered Christian leader and a friend of John the Apostle and Ignatius of Antioch. He was known as a teacher and practical leader. When he was 86 he was sentenced to death by being burned at the stake, but the flames did not harm him. So they stabbed him to death with daggers and then burned him. This second attempt succeeded. For reasons that remain murky, he has been traditionally invoked against dysentery. Perhaps his work took place in an area where dysentery was wide-spread. He's also against earaches, and no one is sure why.

St. Barbara's father was a wealthy man named Dioscorus. When she converted to Christianity, he was so

angry he had her tortured and then beheaded her with his own hands. But on the way home from her execution, he was struck by a lightning bolt and died. People started calling upon Barbara during thunderstorms, then prayed to her against sudden deaths in general. When gunpowder and artillery were invented and used—where sudden deaths became more common—St. Barbara became identified with all the explosion-based activities, and thus became the patron saint of fireworks.

Born circa 560 in Spain, the young St. Isidore was a lousy student. Instead of giving up, he turned to God for help. With that help he became one of the most learned

men of his time, writing a dictionary, encyclopedia and complete history of the Goths. (He should not be confused with St. Isidore the Farmer—who was also Spanish—and who is the patron of, you guested it, farmers and rural communities.) Today the scholar Isidore is widely recognized as the patron saint of both computer users and schoolchildren. In 2003 he was invoked as the patron saint of the internet. Do you think he has a blog?

Captured by Muslims during the First Crusade, St. Adjutor is said to have escaped by swimming (either swimming to Crusader territory or swimming all the way to France; or he might have been recaptured, but then miraculously transported back to France by St. Mary Magdalene.) Or he might have calmed a whirlpool that had emerged beside a boat he was traveling on. Water was involved with him somehow which is why he's now considered the patron saint of swimmers and those in danger of drowning.

St. Columbanus loved the open road so much he spent much of the 6th and 7th century roaming around Europe—and that led to him being considered the patron saint of motorcyclists. (And you thought that was St. Harley.)

In the early 15<sup>th</sup> century St. Bernardino of Siena was such a well- known and crowd-pleasing public preacher, he's now considered the patron saint of advertising and public relations.

If you google around enough, you'll probably be able to find a patron for everyone and every endeavor. Somewhere I saw recently that there was even a pa-

tron saint for murderers; no, it must have been a patron saint of ex-murderers, of repentant murderers, or maybe for those who are so angry that they are tempted to murder someone.


