IS WHAT GOD WANTS WHAT I WANT?

I was raised with an overly romantic and very unrealistic notion of the spiritual life: If I said my prayers sincerely and often, I believed God would draw near and grant my heart's desire. My life was uncomplicated then. I'd pray to pass my spelling test but, just in case, I also studied hard the night before. I passed many spelling tests in this way. I had less success with math and science.

At a certain point it dawned on me that God was not a candy store; he was not primarily in the business of my wish-fulfillment. This came as a disappointment. Perhaps, instead of sitting there listening to my prayers, he expected something *from* me. This was when I started to consider and then nurture a sense that God might have a particular calling for me.

This scared me a bit. If God wanted me to become an infantryman and go to Vietnam, for example, in theory, I believed I better do what God wanted. Every night on the news there was graphic footage of fire fights and carpet bombing. There were soldiers coming home in coffins and people immolating themselves in the streets. Knowing myself and my strengths and weaknesses at least a little, I was sure I would be the worst soldier ever. I'd mention this view to God every now and again, humbly I hoped, just so he would know where I stood on the idea. But then I would pray like Jesus prayed, "But not my will but your will be done." I was no Jesus and so that part of my prayer fooled nobody.

This was all magical thinking. Although there were some dramatic moments in the Bible where God did ask a person to do a specific thing—remember Mary with the angel Gabriel—but even in those cases, the one being asked had the freedom to answer as he or she wished: "Let it be done unto me according to your will." God does not limit his relationship with us to giving out orders and seeing if we obey them or not. He liked to be our companion, like he was at the very beginning with Adam and Eve in the cool of each evening.

One of the ways I started to figure out what to do with my life was to compare my talents to the job at hand. My father had been an accountant; I would sometimes go in with him when he had to work on a Saturday

and I marveled at the way he could add up a line of figures on the adding machine without even looking at the keyboard. His fingers danced over the keys quickly and soon he had his sum. I did not inherit a lot of those particular talents. I didn't want to be an accountant and my excuse was that I was no good at it.

I was good with reading and writing and, especially, religion class. The things of the church fascinated me like sports fascinated my brother. I couldn't get enough of it. I was an altar server, starting in the fifth grade, graduating little by little until I reached the exalted status of Grand Knight.

So, it came as no surprise when I told my parents I wanted to go to the seminary to see if I could be found worthy of being ordained a priest. It would take years and the people in charge were very strict in those days. They knew what kind of a person they were looking for and it was up to you to meet their standard. The things I was required to do, I believed were forming me into the kind of person who would know how to help people spiritually with preaching, the sacraments and drawing parishioners into a community.

The mood in the nation at that time was, however, to suspect all forms of authority. Rather one should be cool and find his or her own groove, follow his own conscience. That was a helpful contrast for me. The Church leadership had a rarified role for a priest to play: be dutiful, be orthodox, follow canon law, obey your bishop, show up on time and whatever you do, do not think for yourself. The bishops were to do the thinking for you, got it? But bishops knew that it was the Pope who was to do the thinking for the bishops. One of the things Vatican II was trying to do was change that way of thinking.

My classmates who were too tightly wound didn't last. Nobody excels by fulfilling a role, no matter how admired. God did not make us to just meet expectations but to give all the various gifts we find inside ourselves and others to be the best, most eccentric and sacrificing people we can be. Life before God was best played all out. Use everything you've been given. Hold nothing back. Msgr. Mike

EXCERPTS FROM BISHOP VANN'S LETTER ON ASSISTED SUICIDE


Recently, a Superior Court judge in Riverside County issued a ruling overturning California's assisted-suicide law. As expected, the ruling has been challenged. Still, I am grateful because it offers us an opportunity to revisit important questions about what constitutes healthcare – especially at the end of life – and about good governance. Acknowledging the strong emotions from deeply personal stories that accompany discussions about end of life, we nonetheless have a duty to develop policy based on the integrity of the human person and the common good. In Orange County, we join with the statewide Whole Person Care Initiative between Catholic health care ministries, dioceses, and parishes in moving forward the conversations and actions to help our loved ones know that they are loved, wanted, and worthy as they contemplate the end of their lives.

We are hosting **“Care, Prepare, and Connect”** on **Wednesday, June 27th from 6:00–8:30 p.m.** at St. Irenaeus in Cypress to help parish leaders and communities continue to improve our accompaniment of families and individuals in need, address access across the continuum of care, Advance Care Planning, and how to start the conversations.

As you all know, building a culture of life requires many components – legal and legislative to name a few. But it also means changing hearts and minds. That starts with our own personal prayer and conversion which should manifest itself in the way that we treat others, particularly those who are suffering the most. I am grateful for your continued support and efforts in these many facets required to build a culture of life.

SACRAMENTS

In order to celebrate the following Sacraments at St. Anne, it is vital to be an active member of our Faith Community.

Baptism: Contact the Parish Office to arrange for baptism.

Baptisms are usually celebrated the first Saturday of the month at 11:00 a.m. Baptism preparations classes for parents and Godparents are held once a month on a Tuesday night at 7:00 p.m.

PreK-8 Faith Formation: Applications for enrollment in next year's faith formation programs are now available.

Confirmation: Students typically begin the Confirmation process as a freshman in high school and complete the process at the end of their sophomore year.

Marriage: An appointment with one of our priests to begin marriage preparation must be made at least 6 months before the wedding celebration.

Funeral: Contact the parish office to arrange funerals.
