# **MOTHERS**

One of the pleasures of being up front in the sanctuary is that I can witness nearly everything that is going on in the congregation. I especially enjoy seeing mothers caring for their little children. Dads do a lot of the caring for their children these days but when you want to keep a kid quiet, you need a professional, and that is where mothers come in.

First off, there is a mother's hip. I don't know if it has a magnet in it or that is naturally formed for this purpose, but a mother's hip is perfectly suited for a small child. One leg on one aide and the other on the other, an infant automatically

knows this is where he or she should roost. The only obvious drawback is that a baby can easily grab on to a mother's necklace and twist it this way and that; if the necklace is sufficiently long, it can also be sucked by the child. (A baby will explore anything and everything first by putting it in his or her mouth.)

Hoping a fussy child can be cradled into sleeping, a mother will sometimes rock back and forth from one leg to the other. If that is insufficient, soft patting on the back with the free hand can be added. If a baby is cranky, it needs to be distracted; sometimes something as simple as blowing air on the child's face can be enough. Handing a larger child something to suck—like a missalette—can also work. A nearby bright light might distract. Quiet humming sometimes does the trick. Even just moving the child from the right hip to the left hip sometimes brings silence. Mothers are creative.

Fathers, I am sorry to say, are rarely as inventive. While taking the child completely out of the church is the last resort for mothers, fathers with a child in their arms are more than likely to back out the door at the first peep from their children. (I will not presume that fathers use a crying child just as an excuse to take a break from a long-winded homily, since our homilies here at St. Anne's are always right to the point.)

From time to time, a parent will come up to me after Mass and apologize for the outbursts of their small children during Mass. They really don't need to. Infants are our most welcome guests, regardless of their behavior. And I am not the only one that feels so. I have rarely seen a scowling face on any of our

parishioners' faces when a baby gets fussy. Many of them have had children of their own and know firsthand the challenges parents face in coming to church with their children. Rather, they are happy to see young families coming to church together. The old timers tell me so all the time.

When we were quite young, my brother and I—being close in age—would bug each other at Mass: a finger in the side, a nudge when getting up, a mean stare, a foot on the toes, anything to get a rise out of the other. (Well, not just at Mass but whenever we were together.) We were doing this at a Mass when the Dominican sisters were kneeling near us in the church. A note came in the mail from one of the sisters the next week admonishing my parents to keep the two of us from being such a distraction at Mass. My mother's reaction: "She should try it sometime and see how well she does." My father's had practical advice: "Put Mike on one side and Tim on the other and the two of us in between." My sister was born not long after that and my brother and I were separated even more. Problem solved.

What really seems to work best is singing. Babies love singing. Why do you think lullabies are so popular? When the congregation is at song, the babies' eyes fill with wonder. So, the best thing you can do to help the parents of our youngest parishioners is to sing along with your other parishioners. A baby near you will be grateful.


