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NOT AT HOME

Our Christmas' take place most often at home, if not your home, then the home of a relative or close friend. There we gather and find food and drink, a comfortable place to sit, a beautiful decorated tree to contemplate and stories being told; often these are the same stories we hear every year; they have become traditions to be remembered annually. "Do you remember the time Uncle Fred nearly burnt down Gramma's house...." "I will never forget when Jimmy surprised us by walking in the door on Christmas eve; we thought he was still in Vietnam."

And yet, nobody was at home on the first Christmas, except for any animals that were sleeping in the stable. Joseph and Mary couldn't even find room in the Bethlehem inn. The shepherds were out in the cold open fields keeping guard of their flocks of sheep. The angels came from heaven, of course, presumably a long way from the hills outside of Bethlehem. Magi from the east came later, after asking for directions in Jerusalem; after all, if you want to find "the newborn king of the Jews" wouldn't you want to check with Herod the current king of the Jews? After the holy family had departed, according to the account in Matthew's gospel, they didn't return home to Nazareth but departed by night for Egypt to escape the wrath of Herod.

Having to leave the comforts of home is a spiritual path. Under the leadership of Moses and Aaron, the Jewish people left the fleshpots in Egypt to make the long and difficult journey across the desert to the promised land. When they forgot what they had learned in the desert, God sent them into exile for sixty years, but even in Babylon, the prophet Ezekiel was given a divine vision. John the Baptist was not found in the cities or villages but appeared preaching in the desert. Like him, Jesus went into the desert to prepare for his ministry by being tempted by the devil. The first two disciples, brothers, were fishermen when Jesus called them to leave their nets and their father to become fishers of men and women. St. Paul left his

whole persecuting life behind him when on the road to Damascus Jesus called him to his vocation to be an apostle.

Through the succeeding centuries many have left their homes in the service of and devotion to Christ. St. Antony of Egypt went into seclusion as a hermit in the desert. Cyril and Methodius were Greek brothers who were sent to preach the gospel to the Moravians. Boniface was born in England but went to Germany where he brought many pagans to the faith. Spanish-born Saint Francis Xavier was a companion of Ignatius Loyola in Paris, was sent to India where he was a highly successful missionary, then on to Indonesia and Japan where he died trying to reach his ultimate goal, China. Eight French Jesuits were sent to parts of Canada and the United States as missionaries to the Huron Indians and were all martyred. Born in Flanders, Belgium, Damien the Leper spent the last sixteen years of his life half-way around the world on the island of Molokai, attending to the spiritual and temporal needs of the lepers who had been quarantined in a camp there. Mother Teresa was born of Albanian parents in what was then the Ottoman empire but went to India to care for the poorest of the poor, founding an order that now extends to all parts of the globe.

Referring to Jesus' birth in a stable, Thomas Merton wrote: "Into this world, this demented inn, in which there is absolutely no room for Him at all, Christ has come uninvited. But because He cannot be at home in it, because He is out of place in it, and yet He must be in it, His place is with those others for whom there is no room. His place is with those who do not belong, who are rejected by power because they are regarded as weak, those who are discredited, who are denied the status of persons, tortured, exterminated. With those for whom there is no room, Christ is present in this world."

AWAKENING TO LIFE

Mary's pregnancy has a few highlight moments in Scripture: the Annunciation, the Visitation, and the Nativity. We're invited to consider these events at multiple times throughout the liturgical year, but they only make up a fraction of the nine months Mary spent carrying Jesus in her womb. How did she spend the rest of her time? Probably engaged in the same sort of homemaking as any wife and expectant mother, albeit the first century version. She prepared meals, washed clothes, and tended to the upkeep of the home, all with the awareness of a new life growing within her. She had hope and anticipation – the very spirit of Advent.

We may not all have the experience of a pregnant mother, but the life of Mary during those nine months is the very life of Advent. Our time of waiting has an end. Our spiritual anticipation has a point of fulfillment. As Jesus was born of Mary, so too can new life be born in us. Every Christmas offers the opportunity to be renewed in the life and love of God.

This transformation brings a communal benefit. Mary's "yes" to the angel Gabriel resounds through-



out time and space, bringing grace to each individual life. We are called to bear Christ to the world as Mary did. When we say "yes" to the plan of God, when we say "yes" to the unexpected, life is always renewed and reborn.
