

EXPERIENCE I

Yesterday evening as I was driving back to the parish for our pastoral council meeting, the sun had just set and the whole horizon was painted with bright orange on top and pacific blue on the bottom. At such times, I thank God not only for being our Creator but for doing such a beautiful job of it. True the Sahara may have too much sand (as camels know) and according to navigators, the Pacific didn't have to be quite so big, but those are small points when confronted by a breathtaking sunset.

God discloses himself in all the workmanship of the universe. A Jewish astronomer looking through his telescope can tell you that, but so can a Muslim researcher studying the DNA of a tiger. For all of us who believe, we are grateful for this manifestation of what John Calvin called an innate "awareness of divinity." But even an unbeliever can perceive the wonder in our lives.


Flannery O'Connor wrote, "The way to despair is to refuse to have any kind of experience." But what kind of experiences? Metropolitan Anthony said "It is not only with our hearts but with the totality of our experience that we know him day by day as the Apostles knew [Christ]." Even or perhaps especially reading can be such a moment, as Elizabeth Hardwick believes, "The greatest gift is the passion for reading. It is cheap, it consoles, it distracts, it excites, it gives you knowledge

of the world and experience of a wide kind. It is a moral illumination." David Brooks finds "I connect more with a smaller group of people who struggle with faith, who wrestle with all the ridiculous unlikelihood of faith. I experienced grace before I experienced God, and sometimes I still have trouble getting back to the source."

It is important to remember that the mixture of faith and doubt can be particularly grace-filled. The great novelist Colm McCann has written, "My responsibility, I think ... is to talk about the dark, anonymous corners of human experience and about the value of those dark, anonymous corners. And intersecting with those dark, anonymous corners you have these famous lives, these big desires, and big issues." We find it in the beautiful complexity of art of any kind: "Complexity lifts art beyond entertainment and 'pleases' in the sense that it provides an encounter, a challenge, an awakening. It places demands on one to be a witness, to take a stand, to consider historical alternatives. It presumes a disposition to be engaged emotionally in the human turmoil. An art that engages and pleases has the multiple effect of an emotional, intellectual and spiritual experience," as David M. Leder has written.

> The Buddhist spiritual writer Pema Chordron highlights the powerful grace that even pain can offer: "The message here is that the only way to ease our pain is to experience it fully. Learn to stay. Learn to stay with uneasiness, learn to stay with the tightening ... so that the habitual chain reaction doesn't rule our lives, and the patterns that we consider unhelpful don't get stronger as the days and months and years go by." We notice this when we meet someone and believe the encounter was the answer to our prayers. Maybe

all experience is an answer to our prayers. This topic will be continued next week but, for now, Wendell Berry gets the last word: "To experience [life] is not to figure it out to even to understand it, but to suffer it and rejoice in it as it is....To treat life as less than a miracle is to give up on it."
