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BIBLE

If you ask people about Catholics, they would say Catholics go to Mass weekly, that Catholics are obedient to the Pope and they have devotions like the rosary and The Stations of the Cross. People aren't likely to note Catholics for their love and knowledge of scripture. Other denominations have "Bible-Thumpers," not Catholics.

Pope Francis wants to change that. Last Sunday was the Word of God Sunday, a Sunday each year which focuses on the scriptures as a gift from God. "The Bible cannot be just the heritage of some, much less a collection of books for the benefit of a privileged few. It belongs above all to those called to hear its message and to recognize themselves in its words," the pope wrote.

A typical "Bible-Thumper" knows his or her chapter and verse but a listener may hear the scriptures used as ammunition to support preconceived views; "proof texting" is what they call it. Hearing the Bible ought to be more like being enchanted by an opera or poetry reading; it's meant to elevate us, to draw us out of ourselves. The theologian, James Alison, highlights this: "Well, one of the things we mean when we say a text is Holy Scripture is that it knows more than we do, and when it doesn't fit into our logic, it is good for us to wrestle with it until it yields its logic to us, until, that is, we can allow its logic to open us up, rather than think that we can dominate it."

The problem is sometimes the opposite; we have heard certain scripture passages repeated so many times that we hear them and automatically think, "Oh that. I already know about that." The U2 singer, Bono, said something very interesting, "I'm not often comfortable in church. It feels pious and so unlike the Christ I read about in the scriptures." Maybe we do well to slow down and read the scriptures with an eye out for what is new, surprising or provocative. Martin Buber, the Austrian thinker, said, "The man of today . . . must read the Scriptures as though they were something entirely

unfamiliar, as though they had not been set before him ready made ... as though he had not been confronted all his life with sham concepts and sham statements which cited the Bible as their authority." Scripture can take your breath away, if you let it.

The passages in the Bible are addressed to each one of us individually. We open the Bible with our questions and problems and circumstances, which it enlightens and reformulates, setting us on unexpected paths. In other words, the scriptures read us as much as we read the scriptures. Read contemplatively, it brings us face to face with who we are.

When I was first ordained, I would read the assigned scriptures for the next weekend with my upcoming homily in mind. What should I tell the parishioners about these readings? I did not preach very well. If I had several Masses on a weekend, I would get bored with what I was saying; you can imagine those hearing me feeling the same way. Somebody must have said something to me because at some point I knew something was missing. Why? If I did not know what the Word of God was saying to me, I was not likely to envision my homily as a "breaking of the Word" that it was supposed to be.

I love something that St. Oscar Romero once said; it inspires all my scripture reading: "The Bible has a very meaningful expression: the Spirit makes all things new. We are those who grow old, and we want everyone made to our aged pattern. The Spirit is never old; the Spirit is always young."

If your Bible is gathering dust on the bookshelf, pull it down and, as Pope Francis said, "experience anew how the risen Lord opens up for us the treasury of his word and enables us to proclaim its unfathomable riches before the world."
